We also discussed the following matters:

Infill Task Force. At the June 5 meeting, Doug Bonner reported on developments with the County's Infill Development Task Force. Because our BCA covenants are limited in scope, these Task Force efforts led by Council Member Roger Berliner are important. Doug has ably represented BCA on the Task Force that proposed legislation for the County, as discussed in my June 6 e-mail to the community.

Welcome committee. As discussed further in a separate article, Kirt West is heading up a committee to welcome neighbors who move into BCA by offering a welcome gift and information to new residents.

Block Captains. The block captains maintain a list of their neighbors to convey important information from the BCA board to promote a safer, more cohesive community. Please make their job easier by contacting them with your information. We also need volunteers to serve as block captains in certain areas, as discussed in Bonnie Garrett's separate report below.

Neighbor Care Network. Dutch Koenig has begun an effort toward establishing a Neighbor Care Network committee, assisted by Abol Pouramidi and others. Activities could include temporary house watching, helping in electrical system outages, etc. This is still at the discussion and concept stage. NEIGHBORHOOD WELCOME COMMITTEE

The BCA Board has authorized the formation of a committee to welcome new families to the neighborhood. Moving into a new neighborhood can be challenging. It took us months before we met any of our neighbors and more than a year before learning of the existence of BCA. Fortunately, we had from Cabin John and were already familiar with the community. The transition would have been more difficult had we arrived from out of town or another part of the county. The genesis of the Welcome Committee comes from my wife, Renee, who continued to do what she had done when we lived in Cabin John-informally welcoming new neighbors by bringing them a plate of brownies and introducing herself to them. As a result, we have gotten to know our neighbors in our court more quickly and I think we have made them feel welcomed.

The purpose of the new Committee is to formalize what many of us have been doing informally. We want to make sure that all new neighbors are welcomed to the community quickly. The Committee has decided that we will put together a package of information about our community to the new residents. This will include information about the schools, police and fire department and Montgomery County services. We will also provide information about local businesses, Glen Echo Park, and Bethesda. At the same time, the Committee will introduce new residents to BCA and

INFILL TASK FORCE

As I discussed at the BCA Meeting May 8, the Montgomery County Zoning Law Amendment covering infill development issues such as building height in R-200 and lot coverage, is scheduled for hearing before the Mo. Co. Council on June 17, 2008 at 7 p.m. at the County Council Hearing Room in Rockville.

The Legislation

Here is a link: http://www.montgomerycountymd.gov/content/council/pdf/zta/2008/08-11.pdf. The bill contains two principal reforms to restrain incompatible infill development in established Mo. Co. neighborhoods:

r) limit building height in R-200 from the current 50' height limit to 35' to roof peak for lots 15K sq. ft or less; to 40' for lots 15K-25K sq. ft; and to 45' for lots that are 25K-40K sq. ft.; and

2) provide for 30% lot coverage for all established lots (recorded before Jan. 1, 1996) of less than 15K sq. ft (an increase for smaller grandfathered R200 lots of 9-10K sq. ft. currently at 25% to conform to what is currently allowed for equivalent sized lots), while reducing lot coverage for lots greater than 15K from 25% to 20% lot coverage. [The bill also reduces lot coverage from 35% to 30% for lots of less than 6K sq. ft.].

These are very reasonable and modest restrictions on Infill Development, which are

necessary to protect the privacy, access to light, and enjoyment of old growth trees that existing neighborhoods in Montgomery County cherish. Also, recent architectural building trends have shown little to no consideration or respect for compatible development within existing neighborhoods. These reasonable measures, including a mandatory neighbor notification requirement before a building permit is granted, are intended to protect existing neighborhoods from building excesses.


Editor's corner: How about a real name for this noble publication?
