

April Bannockburn Creeks Cleanup Project



On April 10, thirty volunteers from the community, and a few visitors, spent most of a delightfully sunny and clear morning

picking trash out of the creeks that run along the southwest corner of Bannockburn. We were a two-platoon outfit, one under John Noble's direction at the Cabin John bridge, and the other, directed by Edith Miles, at Booze Creek on Helmsdale. We were amazed at what we found: metal fence posts,



ATV tires, wall-to-wall carpeting, hammock frames, a couple of bicycles, a baby

carriage, and lots of plastic bags, car parts, wrapping paper, and bottles. During the morning, we pulled out more than 2,000 pounds of trash, filling about 60 yellow trash bags and making impressive piles of hardware that would not fit into trash bags.

After our exertions, we repaired for much-need refreshment to the back terrace of the home of Phil Frank and Vivian Schiller, from which we had a wonderful view of a (cleaner) Booze Creek. If you could not join us this

year, do not despair. We left several

thousand more pounds of junk in the watershed to pick up next year!



Report from the Cabin John Division: John Noble, Chief. We established our Cabin John Creek watershed HQ on the Glen Echo side of the one lane bridge on MacArthur Blvd. 19 volunteers from the neighborhood and beyond took bags,



gloves and determination and descended toward Cabin John Creek and

the feeder creek that joins it at the bridge. Volunteers ranged in age from the seventies through the teens. Some were parents providing models of public service for their children.

A major eyesore that we picked up were dozens of metal fence pipes discarded when the underside of the bridge was re-fenced during its renovation several years ago. In addition we gathered bottles, cans and trash from the days that the parking lot on MacArthur was a location for fish and vegetable vendors. Picking up someone else's trash is never pleasant. Carrying it uphill out of the watershed was hard. Nonetheless, the knowledge that we created a cleaner environment and

Report from Booze Creek Division, Edith Miles, Chief:

Volunteers congregated on Helmsdale Road near River Road at an entrance to Booze Creek. River Road passes over Booze Creek near this point (see map and article in The Bannockburn Banner, December 2009). Three volunteers were from outside BCA: Sandra from Silver Spring and a father and son team. The son goes to Pyle and was working for community service points. Volunteers obtained access to Booze Creek at several sites along Helmsdale Road. They collected about 20 bags of trash. They also pulled out a rusty bicycle, several pipes, and numerous pieces of building materials.

Police Tiips on How to Make Your House Burglar Proof

Make sure you have your house number close to the front and back doors of your house. Dark numbers on light trim are easiest to read. During an emergency, this could save precious moments.

Install a peep hole in your exterior doors if you do not have glass around the door. NEVER open the door to a stranger. Speak through the closed door. Call 911 if you are suspicious of a person.

Add deadbolt locks to all of your doors, particularly those with glass near the doorknob. Remove the key from the lock. If you want to keep a key close to the door for emergencies, make sure it is not reachable from the glass panels in the door and it is not visible.

Make sure to notify a trusted neighbor and/or family member in the area when you are going to be away. Set timers on both indoor and outdoor lights. Arrange for papers, mail and flyers to be taken in, and ask a neighbor to place some trash in your super can and wheel it to the alley on trash day. Arrange for the lawn to be mowed while you are away. These simple steps can greatly reduce your chances of becoming the next burglary victim.

Check your surroundings before getting out of your car on your way into the house, and out of the house on your way into your vehicle.

Remove all valuables from sight near windows and glass doors in your home, especially purses. Store expensive jewelry in safe deposit boxes, take pictures of the jewelry, get the jewelry appraised. If you store jewelry in your home, DO NOT store jewelry in the master bedroom.

Get to know your neighbors. If you know who belongs on your block, it is easier to spot someone who does not belong. Report suspicious behavior to the police. If you suspect it is a crime, call 911. Use the words "Possible Crime in Progress." Get involved in your community.

Seth Goldstein -- Laverock -- Kinetic Sculptures

Seth Goldstein studied Mechanical and Electrical Engineering at MIT for 8 years and worked in industry for 6 years. In 1971 he joined the National Institutes of Health and spent the next 31 years in the Biomedical Engineering Division where he was a section chief and developed biomedical instrumentation and clinical instruments.

Since his retirement in 2002, he has created several complex kinetic sculptures, one of which, Cram Guy, is in the American Visionary Arts Museum in Baltimore. Short videos of Cram Guy and Why Knot?, a machine which ties and unties a



necktie, can be seen at http://www.youtube.com/user/kineticsculptures. He is currently finishing a multi-year project to develop a machine which plays a violin (including vibrato

and pizzicato).

Seth has lived in the Bannockburn neighborhood for the last 15 years with his wife, Paula Stone, a retired engineer, who now writes plays. They collaborate to create and exhibit sculptures made of Oriental Bittersweet, a large invasive vine they cut from threatened trees.

Information for BCA Seniors

BCA Good Neighbor's Committee members have sponsored several activities for seniors in our neighborhood including a holiday party (see attached photos), 2 luncheons, and a table at the Spring Fling. Several seniors also participated in the BCA Spring Watershed Cleanup and in the Booze Creek Walk.


The committee sponsored a meeting March 24 titled "Aging-in-Place Alone or with an Ailing Spouse".

Harry Rosenberg, a co-founder of Burning Tree Village and a recent widower, described his experiences of living alone. BCA seniors discussed the



challenges and rewards of continuing to live in their own homes. Advantages of aging-in-place include having good friends and neighbors and having space for possessions, hobbies, and professional activities. Disadvantages

include having to prepare food and to eat alone and having to deal with home and garden maintenance. Two seniors who lost power for 3-4 days during the storm have decided to move. Their experiences led to a discussion of the need for the Good Neighbors Committee and BCA Block Captains to do more to identify seniors with problems during storms. We also



Loss of electrical power can be life threatening for seniors and others with disabilities who are dependent on electricity to power medical equipment, lifts or elevators. Loss of AC or heat can also be life threatening in hot summers or cold winters. Portable generator units are sometimes used. Stationary, outsidemounted generators are a growing alternative (Consumers Reports, Oct. 2006 p. 60). These emergency automatic backup generators are

powered by natural gas. They can provide a safe and convenient, though expensive and often noisy, solution during power failures. Smaller generators that power only part of the house are less expensive than whole house generators. Several brands of generators are available from local installers.
