



any of you know Jennifer Kawar as a tireless force to be reckoned with — she helps to organize Bannockburn Citizens Association meetings and events as well as being an active member of the BCA Environmenat Committee. Jenny has been instrumental in introducing the Banner publisher to interesting families and stories in the Bannockburn Estates neighborhood (who chose to be featured in the publication)!

Now, Jenny has decided to share a cherished memory of hers with the neighborhood as she shares stories and pictures of her recent visit to Switzerland's Upper Engadin in late September/early October 2014.

Parc Naziunal Svizzer just celebrated its 100th anniversary and as Jenny noted:

Everything in the park is spotlessly clean and nature-oriented in Switzerland's only National Park in the Upper/Lower Engadin in SE Switzerland's Alps.

The Swiss National Park, founded in 1914, is the oldest in the Alps. Park rules follow strict conservation of nature guidelinesone is not allowed to leave the hiking paths – protecting the habitat for ibexes, chamois, marmots, northern hares, lizards and innumerable birds which Jenny observed in the wild. Staying on the hiking trails suited Jenny just fine as she received her 100mile award honoring two weeks of continuous mountain hiking with her good friends Gabi and Rainer as her hosts/guides through the Upper and Lower Engadin.

Jenny noted the park is full of changing exhibitions and multiple "exploration excursions" for children and families that lead far into the park and encourage the playful exploration and discovery of the environment by children and a deeper understanding and reverence for nature even the teenagers understand!

Rainer was an excellent guide taking the group to upper or lower Engadin trails based upon carefully monitoring weather forecasts and started the group in the valleys and worked up to steeper terrain as all became acclimated to the difficult hikes — although Rainer occasionally disappeared for an even steeper trek.

One of the highlights of Jenny's numerous hikes were the cows coming down to the valley from their summer pastures. Jenny noted the young boys herding the cows with the assistance of cracking whips and clanging bells to ward off evil did a surprisingly good job (given the shots of liquor they, by custom, consumed along the route and they also distributed many cookies to the crowd that were along the parade route. The cows (especially the older Grande Dames) looked majestic dressed up in their wreaths of flowers and customary bells around their necks.

Also along the way Jenny and her hiking compadres ran into a couple of stubborn horses that refused to give up the "right of way." When Jenny did maneuver around the grey horse in rear, seemingly not paying attention as she grazed, decided to nudge them off "her" trail...maybe the "old grey mare" IS still what she used to be!

There are many more stunning pictures to share as Rainer's weather forecasting seemed to always insure the best views — but we will leave you with these pictures and a request for Jenny's permission to share others with her neighbors in the Bannockburn Estates at a later time!






Our Dawn Redwood

When a half a dozen BCA members got together in May 2006 to beautify the triangle at the junction of Broxburn and Crail Drives, one of the tasks was to plant a small spindly tree donated by my wife, Paula Stone. When she had purchased it at Winterthur Gardens, all she knew about it was its name - Dawn Redwood, and that it looked like a tree in the neighborhood that we frequently passed on our walks. We subsequently

learned that prior to 1944 this tree had been thought to be extinct for 50 million years!

In 1941, in the midst of the Second World War, Japanese paleobotanist Shigeru Miki first coined the name Metasequoia for an extinct common but perplexing species well-known in Northern Hemisphere fossil collections in a paper on the change of flora in eastern Asia since the Tertiary Period. Also in 1941, a Chinese forester discovered a very unusual tree in a remote region of China on the Sichuan-Hubei border. It was not until 1944 that specimens were collected, by the Central Bureau of Forest Research, in Nanjing. In 1945, they were examined at the National Central University where it was realized that they belonged to a conifer genus previously unknown in the living flora of China, and the connection was made to the prior Japanese work. In 1946, two expeditions were sent out to collect more material and explore the region in search of more trees. Twenty-two additional trees were found and more adequate herbarium specimens were collected. Herbarium specimens were sent to the Arnold Arboretum (Harvard University) whose Director, Prof. E. D. Merrill, was able to obtain funds (from the Save the Redwoods League) to finance another expedition to make a fuller investigation of the area and to collect more specimens and viable seeds. This expedition was sent out in September 1946 and spent three months in the vicinity of the previously explored area and in the neighboring Province of [Hubei]. The expedition found more than 100 large trees growing on slopes, along small streams and growing near rice paddies. Seeds were received at the Arnold Arboretum early in January 1948, and many had germinated before the end of the month. Mainly through the generosity of the Arnold Arboretum in sharing its seeds and seedlings, Metasequoia was soon propagated and distributed in many parts of North America

and Europe as well as in eastern Asia. Most dawn redwoods outside of China are descended from these seeds- collected from trees thought to be extinct.

The two photos show the tree as planted, and later during this past winter. An unusual feature of Dawn Redwoods is that they are "evergreens" which lose their needles each fall after turning a beautiful golden brown color.

While asphalt shingle roofing is the most common type of sloped roofing, there are many other types of roofing that are widely used, providing excellent wear and appearance characteristics - although most all require more homeowner attention. Among the non-asphalt types of roofing are slate, wood shingle, wood shake, tile and cement roofs. Each has its own distinctive look, economic life and maintenance requirements.

SLATE

This type of roofing has been used for roofing purposes for hundreds of years around the world. Most slate roofs have an extended life span with slate from Vermont and Virginia lasting the longest (50+ years) with proper annual care; service life of roofs made with Pennsylvania slate is in the moderate range (35+ years). All slate roofs should be checked periodically by a professional slater - check credentials before contracting. The major areas of concern in your annual roof check-up are the flashings (the cause of most roof leaks), missing or cracked slates (caused by freezing and thawing, as well as by downward pressure from a tree limb or workman's foot), rusted nails and damaged ridge slates. Failure to provide an adequate level of preventive maintenance will result in a poor aesthetic appearance and a much reduced economic life span.

WOOD SHINGLES AND SHAKES

About 10% of the residential roofs are covered with wood either shingles or shakes. Most all wood roofs are made from red cedar. Shingles, which are less expensive than shakes, are sawn to a uniform shape. With care, they have an expected economic life span of 15 to 20 years. Their more expensive cousins, wood shakes, are thicker, often hand-split, and generally last longer with regular care. Both wood shingles and shakes come in varying grades, depending on the quality and thickness of the product. A fire retardant pretreatment is recommended, and required in some areas, to minimize the chance of fire spread.

TILE AND CONCRETE

The classic red clay roofing tile has long been the roofing mainstay of quality homes through the southern tier of the United States. Clay tiles are available in many shapes from the traditional half barrel shape to flat shapes resembling wood shingles.

Although unglazed clay tiles are porous and hold dampness, they have a long expected life span of 40+ years, if maintained. In high humidity areas, clay tiles should be pressure cleaned to prevent or minimize darkening caused by mold or mildew. If allowed to go unchecked, this condition will set in the tiles and affect its life and appearance. Many roofers are unfamiliar with clay tile and will recommend replacing rather than repairing. Clay tiles weather well but are prone to breakage like slate. Concrete roof tiles have become quite popular in the warm climates of the United States. Formulated of cement, sand and water, they are formed in many shapes from flat to curve. While quite durable (average expected economic life span of 25 to 40 years if maintained), concrete tiles are very heavy and require proper roof framing support.

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
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

TOP HISTORIC SITES

The capital of Catalonia is full of history, architecture and art. Every neighborhood has its own soul and rituals, and the only way to discover them is to spend some time in each of them - walking the city will allow you to discover it for yourself.

If your time is limited, you can stay in the very center and explore Gracia, El Raval and El Gotic and El Born. If you have a whole week, though, you'll have just enough time to explore the whole city, including the neighborhoods of Sant Gervasi, Sants, La Barceloneta and Poble Nou. If you are hoping to visit monuments or museums, be sure to show up first thing in the morning; the admission lines can be long. Book in advance whenever possible, to avoid the crowds.

Passeig de Gràcia

This is the main street in Barcelona for shopping. It stretches for a mile and is full of shops and restaurants; it's also where almost all the big modernist buildings are (among the most beautiful and famous: La Casa Fuster, la Casa Ametller and La Pedrera). Be aware that, except for very late at night, prices are a higher because of the high tourist traffic and the food may not the best.

Sagrada Familia

This masterpiece of Antonin Gaudí is one of the most famous churches in the world. The new chapel is so spectacular that even the locals are lining up to see it again and again. Have patience and go there early: you won't be disappointed. Remarkably, the church has been under construction since 1882 and has yet to be completed.

This street is so famous that it even has its own verb in Spanish: ramblejar. "Rambling" in Barcelona means to wander up and down Las Ramblas on foot. Las Ramblas has many attractions, like La Boqueria market and the Columbus monument, but the biggest draw is the street itself.

El Born

This is the most historically relevant of all Barcelona's neighborhoods. Most of the buildings here are centuries old and have no elevators; many streets are so narrow that there is a no-carsallowed policy in the entire area. The Catalan resistance in the 1714 war is reflected in sites like El Fossar de les Moreres and El Museu del Born.

L'Eixample

If you are a fan of history you must visit this neighborhood. This is where the "new Barcelona" had its beginnings in the middle of the 19th century. The municipal plan (called Cerdà) called for the creation of a large central square, so the city could build around it in a new way. The avenues here are broad, with dozens of shops and restaurants, but the best things are the buildings that surround them: they embody the city's history.





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



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
