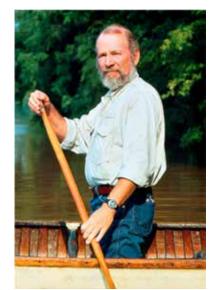
## The Sycamore Island Club, Part 2

In the Banner's April issue, we learned about the nearby Sycamore Island Canoe Club, which was founded in 1885 to create a place where canoeing and camaraderie were the order of the day. Things haven't changed much since then. And the members and area residents who use it want to keep it that way. They see the island as a getaway, a rustic retreat to escape to enjoy nature and access to the Potomac. Several Bannockburn Estates residents are members of the Island. Here are some of their thoughts about what this timeless oasis means to them.

John and Diane Nobel have lived in Bannockburn Estates since 1975 and have

been members of Sycamore Island since 1977. They noticed the Island years back during a run along the canal and thought it was a unique access to the river and nature. Both John and Diane enjoy canoeing and being out of doors, so joining the Island made perfect sense to them. When asked what they like most about being members, John and Diane reply, "We access the Island year round. It is a mere 1.5 miles on foot via the trail to the C&O Canal by the one lane bridge. Just last year we enjoyed walking across after a big freeze. The ferry ride to the Island and the privacy of a picnic under the sycamores with the Potomac surrounding us is always a pleasure. The Island monthly meetings are social events. "

John especially enjoys the island and has, over the years, served in Island governance through service as Large Parties and Camping Supervisor, Membership Secretary and presently as Vice-President. John aptly describes the dearness of the Island in a piece he wrote for the Sycamore Islander newsletter entitled What Sycamore Island Means to Me. "The Island's pleasures live in my mind and comfort me. Recollections of a swim, a paddle up river, reading on the porch, and picnicking with friends come to mind a thousand times more frequently than visits to the Island. The land, water, and buildings that are Sycamore Island reality become much more in our day-to-day lives. We have a sense of possessiveness for this unique social and physical environment made possible by those that have preceded us for over 100 years. Sycamore Island is my refuge. It is timeless, it is basic, and it is welcoming."

Cecily Abrams has lived in Bannockburn Estates since 2001 and is also a member of Sycamore Island Club. She first went to the island as a parent chaperone for her son's Cub Scout den wanting to earn a particular badge. At that time, joining was with very little wait and completely affordable for a young family. Cecily has remained a member even after a divorce and her children now grown. As a side note, she quips, "When I divorced, we were the first and possibly the only membership the club offered to give to both parties!" What does belonging to the Island mean to Cecily? "I like being on the river in such a quiet, natural setting for picnics and occasional canoeing. It affords a chance to interact with club members as well as bring guests and musician friends to enjoy the surroundings. The ferry is a throwback to yesteryear with a very "today" caretaker in tune to appreciation and care of the island."

Another couple, Sarah Fox and Bill Eichbaum, who reside in Bannockburn Estates, are also long-time members of Sycamore Island. Bill first joined the club in the early nineties shortly after he went to work for The World Wildlife Fund. At the time, he was living in Glen Echo Heights. Sarah joined the club when the two married in 2000 and moved to Bannockburn. Bill acquired his love of canoeing and the water growing up in the Wilmington, Delaware area, spending many hours on The Brandywine Creek. Sarah spent summers at her family's summer home on the Canadian shores of Lake Erie where all kinds of boats and water sports filled the days.

Bill recalls that after a few years as a member he was elected President and served in that role for several years during which

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both a new caretaker had to be hired and new canoe sheds designed and built after the floods of early 1996. "Getting consensus on both matters from the richly diverse membership of the club was a Herculean task!"

Over the years, afternoon canoe trips, especially in the fall, have always been enjoyable for the couple. Bill also enjoys an occasional fishing trip he makes from time to time in the wooden Herreshoff-designed kayak he built a couple of decades ago. The club inspires a great appreciation for the Potomac not just through canoeing but many other activities which include annual late winter bird and early spring flower walks. Both Sarah and Bill feel that when out on the Potomac at Sycamore Island it is often hard to believe that you are not on some remote mighty river of the western United States. "Luckily we are in our own backyard!" they exclaim.

Roland Backhaus and Avery Roselle, who live on Wilson Lane, joined the club in 2015. They have two daughters age 5 and 2. As Roland explains, "We joined in an effort to ensure that our girls grow up in nature and appreciating nature. In fact, that's the main reason we settled in Bannockburn. We love going to the island to take a break from the polish of Bethesda. The girls love the rope swing and the barge in the summertime."

Though hardly spartan, the island is simple. There are no sea-doos or fancy electronics. The unheated clubhouse features a pool table, pingpong table, and wood-burning stove. Canoeing, picnicking, birding, and

wildflower walks are the main attractions. Accessible mainly by ferry, the club once was and still is a place to get away from the day-to-day hubbub of busy lives. It was and is and will hopefully remain for generations to come, a place to dream as well as a place to find the regenerating forces of nature.

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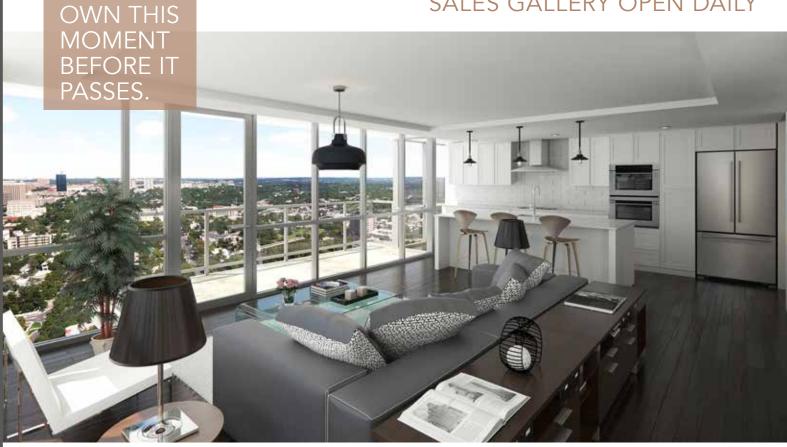
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## Meet Ellie, a.k.a. Sir Elliot!

## BCA Meeting:

## A Lawyer at the NATIONAL CANCER INSTITUTE

## in the neighborhood

At the March Bannockburn Citizens Association meeting, residents enjoyed an opportunity to visit with neighbors, discuss BCA activities and hear reports from the various committees and were treated to a most interesting talk by Carol Weil, Program Director, Ethical & Regulatory Affairs at the National Cancer Institute as reported by John Noble.

What is a lawyer doing at the National Cancer Institute, I asked myself as I sat down to hear Bannockburn Citizens Association resident Carol Weil speak March 2 at the Association's quarterly meeting at St. Mark's Church.

Ms.Weil helps researchers think through regulatory and ethical issues related to their work. In the course of hearing more about this, we were exposed to the new directions in cancer

research, exploring and addressing the genetic determinants of cancer.

When analyzing a subject's DNA, the process produces far more than the just the DNA related to the cancer being studied. Studying the molecules to determine a therapy is the goal. But there is also the ethical question: "Do you tell the subject that they also may have a genetic predisposition to diseases X and Y?"

After hearing this, I am glad she is our lawyer/ ethicist on duty at NCI. But wait; there is a much more to fill Ms. Weil's day. With a multi-billion dollar budget, I imagine so. One example follows:

"How good is the process of patient consent, whereby a research subject whose life may be at risk says 'Go ahead' or 'Forget it; I am out-a-here'?" Researchers want to improve

their communication with potential subjects to assure they truly understand the guts of the research study they are getting into. And what are the odds of a cure or complications. To do less opens NCI to ethical and legal liability.

Before participants broke into a bevy of challenging questions, our speaker spoke of patient medical literacy training and the role of genetic counseling. She portrayed it as an important component to help research subjects and other patients in the new world of understanding genetic determinants of disease and treatment.















## Where did you grow up? How long have you lived in the area? Tell us about your family:

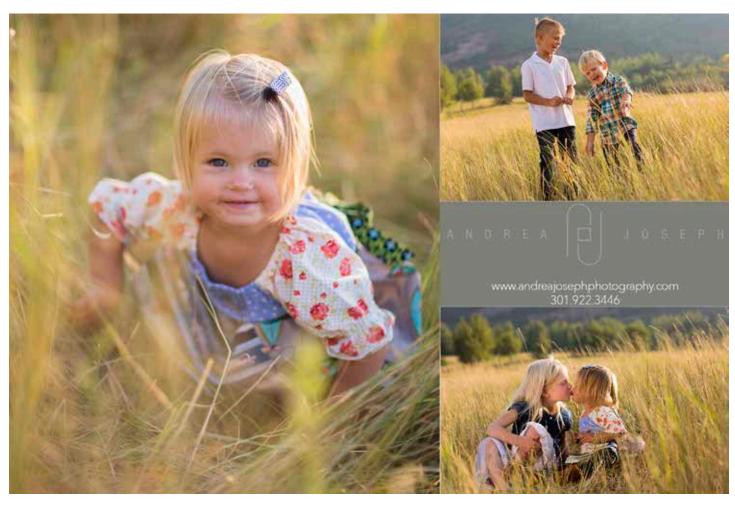

2 large eggs

1/2 cp. sugar

1 tsp. vanilla extract

1 1/2 cups whole macadamia nuts, unsalted

## **INSTRUCTIONS**

- Line 2 heavy cookie sheets with parchment. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- Place 8 oz. bittersweet chocolate in a microwave proof bowl with the butter. Melt in a microwave oven, stirring every 15 seconds.
- Using a handheld electric mixer set on high speed, beat the eggs, sugar and vanilla extract until well blended. On the lowest speed, add the melted chocolate mixture and beat just until combined. Mix in the baking powder and then the flour, just until combined. With a spoon, fold in the remaining chocolate chips and the nuts.
- Using 2 teaspoons, drop the batter onto the prepared cookie sheets by heaping teaspoonfuls, mounding each one as high as possible. Bake for 9 to 10 minutes, until the tops are dry. The cookies will still be very soft when they are removed from the oven, but they will firm up as they cool.
- Cool completely on the baking sheets and then peel them off and store them in an airtight container at room temperature. The cookies will last for weeks, but they are at their best if consumed within a couple of days.

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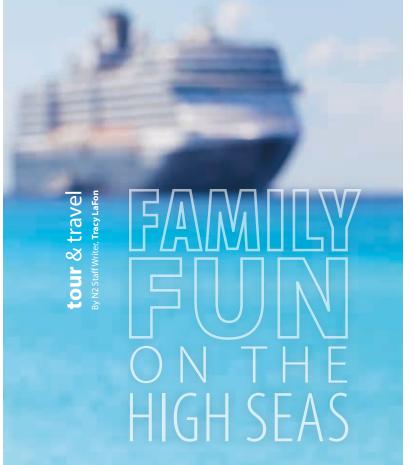
